OF THE 110th CONGRESS

WHAT A DIFFERENCE an election makes.

Thousands of AFT members mobilized to play a crucial role in 2006 to elect a new labor- and education-friendly majority in Congress. Many members of the Class of 2006 recalled on Election Night how instrumental the union's efforts were in their hard-fought races.

From the moment members of the new majority were handed the gavel of power two years ago, it was clear they wanted to chart a new course for America as they proposed and promoted an agenda that works for AFT members, their families and their communities.

The 110th Congress hit the ground running and has produced a solid record of achievement. The U.S. Senate and House of Representatives each passed bills, now signed into law, that have secured the largest investment in college aid since the 1944 GI Bill of Rights. The 110th Congress also fought for and won the first increase in the federal minimum wage in a decade. Other congressional successes include House passage of the Employee Free Choice Act—legislation which recognizes that employees have a basic right to bargain for a better life, including fair wages, adequate healthcare and secure pensions—and the House's effort in blocking the Colombia Free Trade Agreement, a flawed trade proposal sought by the Bush administration that compromised the interests of U.S. workers while ignoring the plight of embattled trade unionists in Colombia.

AFT members turned out in record numbers to play a key role in these successes by meeting with and contacting their elected officials to promote the union's position on these issues. Member activism was central to fending off a completely unacceptable proposal to reauthorize the No Child Left Behind Act.

Although we have much to be proud of, many challenges await us. Narrow congressional majorities and a president out of touch with the needs of

working families have combined to prevent major legislative action on key proposals. Opposition led by the minority leadership in the House and Senate, and encouraged by the White House, has prevented the new majority from making progress on some of the major issues facing our nation. These include efforts to provide health insurance to more than 3 million children in poverty; to reform our labor laws; to fix No Child Left Behind; and to move forward a second stimulus package that will create jobs by investing in our nation's infrastructure as well as bring much-needed fiscal relief to the states.

So the stakes are even higher in 2008. We must expand our pro-AFT majorities in the House and especially in the Senate if we are to be successful in fighting off bad policies and promoting good ones. In

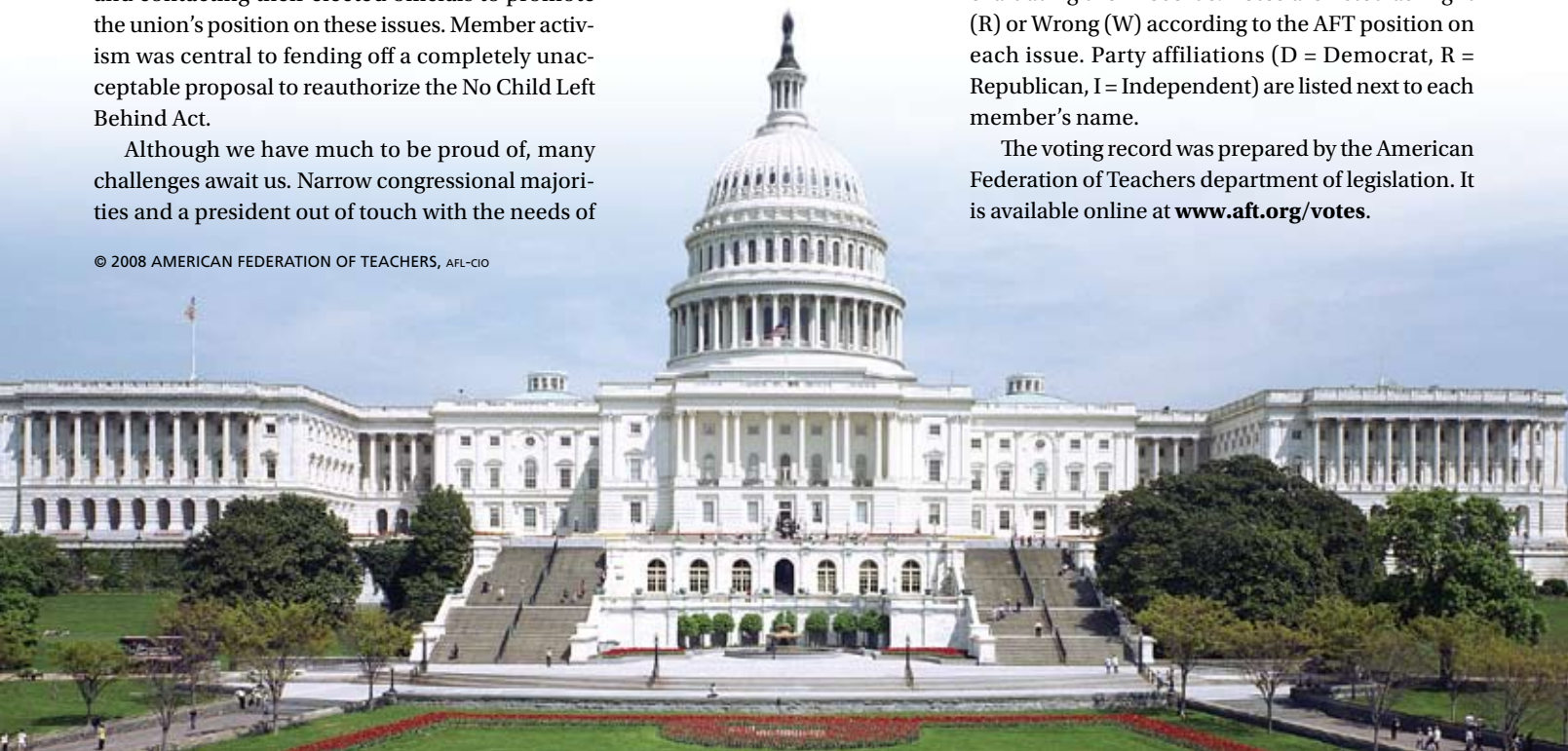
November, we must elect a president who will partner with the expanded majority to develop bipartisan policies that will advance and secure labor's agenda for working families.

The aggressive advocacy efforts of AFT members must continue. This hard work will be rewarded if we all pull together and elect a president and a Congress dedicated to addressing our domestic and foreign policy issues in a constructive and thoughtful way.

This voting record, spanning 2007-08, contains a selection of the votes that are especially important for AFT members, the institutions in which we work, and the people we serve. It provides a summary of how your elected legislators in Congress have voted on key issues and should be helpful in evaluating their records. Votes are listed as Right (R) or Wrong (W) according to the AFT position on each issue. Party affiliations (D = Democrat, R = Republican, I = Independent) are listed next to each member's name.

HOUSE VOTES

1. Medicare Prescription Drug Costs:

The Medicare Prescription Drug Act of 2007 (H.R. 4) improves the Medicare prescription drug law by correcting a flaw that prohibited the federal government from negotiating certain prescription prices with pharmaceutical manufacturers. H.R. 4 could significantly lower the cost of prescription drugs for Medicare beneficiaries. H.R. 4 was passed by the House on Jan. 12, 2007, by a vote of 225-170. **A yes vote is a right vote.**

2. Employee Free Choice Act: H.R. 800, the bipartisan Employee Free Choice Act of 2007 (EFCA), addresses problems in federal law that make it difficult for workers to form a union. EFCA would begin to level the playing field for workers trying to form a union in the face of employer opposition by creating a penalty for employers who violate workers' rights, providing impartial mediation and arbitration to settle first-contract disputes, and granting automatic recognition of the union when a majority of workers seek representation. EFCA passed the House on March 1, 2007, by a vote of 241-185. **A yes vote is a right vote.**

3. Head Start/Block Grants: Rep. Tom Price (R-Ga.) offered an amendment to the Head Start reauthorization bill (H.R. 1429) that would have created a block grant demonstration program for Head Start. Block grants such as this fail to guarantee that states would continue to meet the high standards for student performance and the staff qualifications that have been fundamental to the success of Head Start. This would undermine accountability and quality. The amendment was rejected 165-254 on May 2, 2007. **A no vote is a right vote.**

4. Budget Resolution: The conference agreement on the budget resolution for fiscal year 2008 (S. Con. Res. 21) rejected the Bush administration's proposed budget cuts in health, education and training programs. Instead, it provided \$50 billion to expand the State Children's Health Insurance Program (SCHIP) and another \$9.5 billion for increases in No Child Left Behind (NCLB), Pell Grants and the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA). The House passed the conference report on May 17, 2007, by a 214-209 vote. **A yes vote is a right vote.**

Student Loans: The College Cost Reduction Act of 2007 (H.R. 2669) will help college-bound students by lowering certain student loan interest rates and increasing the maximum Pell Grant award for eligible middle- and low-income families. The bill also provides additional support for those entering the teaching profession. The bill passed 273-149 on July 11, 2007, and was enacted. **A yes vote is a right vote.**

6. Public Employee Collective Bargaining:

On July 17, 2007, the House passed the Public Employer-Employee Safety Cooperation Act (H.R. 980), 314-97. The bill, a top labor priority, extends collective bargaining rights to public safety officers (correctional officers, firefighters, police officers and emergency medical personnel) with the right to bargain in states where they are currently unable to do so. **A yes vote is a right vote.**

7. Teacher Incentive Fund: Rep. Tom Price (R-Ga.) offered an amendment to a funding bill (H.R. 3043) that would have taken \$21 million from school improvement programs and redirected the funds to the Teacher Incentive Fund, which funds unproven merit-pay programs. The amendment was rejected 149-274 on July, 18, 2007. **A no vote is a right vote.**

8. Wage Discrimination: Lilly Ledbetter, who worked for Goodyear Tire & Rubber Co. for more than 20 years, was paid less than her male counterparts for the same work. It was only after she stopped working that she discovered

the pay differential and filed suit. The Lilly Ledbetter Fair Pay Act (H.R. 2831) would overturn a 2007 U.S. Supreme Court ruling that limited workers' ability to sue employers for illegal pay discrimination under the Civil Rights Act. The court ruling held that a worker only has 180 days from the date of the first discriminatory paycheck to file, even if the worker had no way of knowing about the pay disparity at the time of the discrimination. H.R. 2831, opposed by the Bush administration, passed July 31, 2007, by 225-199. **A yes vote is a right vote.**

9. SCHIP Veto Override: Long supported by the AFT, the State Children's Health Insurance Program (SCHIP) provides healthcare coverage to more than 6 million low-income children. The law was scheduled to be reauthorized in 2007, and the House and Senate ultimately reached a compromise that not only would have renewed the program but also expanded coverage to more than 3 million additional children. President Bush vetoed the compromise measure on Oct. 3, 2007. A two-thirds vote by the House and Senate is required to override the veto. The veto override failed on Oct. 18, 2007, by a 273-156 vote. **A yes vote is a right vote.**

10. Colombia Free Trade Fast Track: Fast-track procedures require an up or a down vote on a trade agreement within 90 days of the date the president submits the treaty to Congress. The Bush administration submitted the Colombia Free Trade Agreement that was opposed by the labor movement, civil rights groups and many in Congress. The vote to suspend fast-track requirements was adopted by the House on April 10, 2008, 224-195. **A yes vote is a right vote.**

SENATE VOTES

1. Medicare/Prescription Drug Coverage:

Many of our nation's seniors face soaring costs for prescription drugs. The Medicare Part D prescription drug program was designed to help offset these costs, but a prohibition supported by the Bush administration prevented the federal government from using its purchasing power to negotiate for lower prices. S. 3, the Medicare Prescription Drug Price Negotiation Act of 2007, which would allow Medicare to negotiate with drug makers, was blocked by Republicans when the proponents of the measure failed to get the 60 votes required to end a filibuster on April 18, 2007, 55-42. **A yes vote is a right vote.**

2. Employee Free Choice Act: The Employee Free Choice Act (H.R. 800), if passed and enacted, would allow more workers the freedom to form unions by allowing employees to sign authorization cards seeking union representation and by recognizing the workers' unions after a majority of workers sign cards. Consideration of H.R. 800 was blocked on June 26, 2007, when a vote to end the Republican-led filibuster failed, 51-48, to reach the 60 votes necessary to invoke cloture. **A yes vote is a right vote.**

3. Student Loans: The College Cost Reduction Act of 2007 (H.R. 2669) increased the maximum Pell Grants award for middle- and low-income students and reduced student loan rates, making the prospect for attending college easier for many students. The bill also provided increased support for those entering the teaching profession. The bill passed the Senate 78-18 on July 20, 2007. **A yes vote is a right vote.**

4. SCHIP: The State Children's Health Insurance Program (SCHIP) needed to be reauthorized in 2007. The Senate considered a bill to reauthorize and expand SCHIP. The bill was passed on Aug. 2, 2007, 68-31. President Bush ultimately vetoed the bill on Oct. 3, 2007. **A yes vote is a right vote.**

5. DREAM Act: The Development, Relief and Education for Alien Minors (DREAM) Act (S. 2205) would provide immigrant students who have been living in the United States for more than five years the opportunity to gain a postsecondary education and to obtain special immigration status from the federal government, putting them on the path to legalization if they have not already begun this process. A motion to close debate and move forward on the bill failed 52-44 (60 votes are required to end debate) on Oct. 24, 2007. **A yes vote is a right vote.**

6. Budget Resolution: The Senate passed a budget for fiscal year 2009 (S. Con. Res. 70) that rejected most of President Bush's proposed cuts in

domestic programs, including education, Medicare and Medicaid, and Head Start. The Democratic plan also included funding for the expansion of SCHIP and increased funding for key education programs. The Senate Democratic plan passed 51-44 on March 14, 2008. **A yes vote is a right vote.**

7. Wage Discrimination: The Lilly Ledbetter Fair Pay Act of 2007 (H.R. 2831), which would have restored long-standing protections against pay discrimination that were eliminated by the U.S. Supreme Court, was passed by the House July 31, 2007. On April 23, 2008, Senate Democrats tried to bring up the bill, but with a 56-42 vote fell short of the 60 votes necessary to end debate. **A yes vote is a right vote.**

8. Public Employee Collective Bargaining: On May 13, 2008, the Senate voted to end a Republican-led filibuster against the Public Safety Employer-Employee Cooperation Act (H.R. 980), a bill that would expand collective bargaining rights for public safety employees. Currently, public safety officers in nearly half of the states are denied the right to bargain. The bill would provide correctional officers, firefighters, police officers and emergency medical personnel with the right to bargain over wages, hours and working conditions. Sixty votes are required to end the filibuster, and the motion passed 69-29. **A yes vote is a right vote.**
