U.S. Virgin Islands Teacher Salaries Among Lowest in the Nation

Washington, D.C.— The U.S. Virgin Islands' lagged behind the most of the nation with its 2002-03 average teacher salary of \$34,764, according to the American Federation of Teachers' annual teacher salary survey released Thursday.

Teacher salaries on the U.S. Virgin Islands ranked below those of most of U.S. states and territories. They were also far below the 2002-03 national average teacher salary of \$45,771.

Among the U.S. territories, Puerto Rico's average teacher salary for 2002-03 was \$22,164; and Guam's was \$34,738.

Across the U.S., teachers' salaries remained relatively stagnant while their share of health benefits rose at all-time high rates, making it difficult to attract and keep good teachers at a time when they are increasingly needed, the report said.

Nationally, the 2002-03 average teacher salary, which is the most recent figure available, was \$45,771, up 3.3 percent from the previous year. The average beginning teacher salary was \$29,564, up 3.2 percent from the year before. But AFT's report noted that teachers' share of health insurance costs spiked an average 13 percent, according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics.

"Exorbitant health insurance costs are taking an intolerable bite out of already inadequate teacher salaries. Teachers are being asked to do more, shortages persist in the most challenging areas to teach, yet compensation packages are insulting," said AFT Secretary-Treasurer Edward J. McElroy.

Furthermore, the AFT noted, superintendents' average salaries are as much as four times higher than teachers' average pay. "States and school districts are crying poverty when it comes to teachers' pay yet somehow find money for extravagant administrator salaries," McElroy said.

California led the nation with the highest average teacher salary for 2002-03, at \$55,693. South Dakota had the lowest average teacher salary on the U.S. mainland, at \$31,383. Alaska led the nation with the highest average beginning teacher salary for 2002-03, at \$37,401. Montana had the lowest average beginning teacher salary on the U.S. mainland, at \$23,052.
