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Wyoming's Teacher Salaries Drop

Washington, D.C.—Wyoming ranked 42nd in the nation for its 2002-03 average teacher salary, reflecting a decrease over the previous year, according to the annual teacher salary survey released by the American Federation of Teachers on Thursday.

Wyoming's average teacher salary for the 2002-03 was \$37,789, down 0.2 percent from the previous year, placing the state 42nd in the nation. Wyoming ranked 44th for average beginning teacher salary for a 2002-03, at \$25,694, up 3.2 percent from the year before. The AFT estimates that Wyoming's average starting salary for the most recent school year, 2003-04, was \$26,516.

Wyoming's 42nd spot for average teacher salary bested its neighbor to the north, Montana, which was 47th, at \$35,754. But it trailed other neighbors: Colorado was 22nd, at \$42,679; Idaho was 32nd, at \$39,784; and Utah was 38th, at \$38,268.

Across the country, teachers' salaries remained relatively stagnant while their share of health benefits rose at all-time high rates, making it difficult to attract and keep good teachers at a time when they are increasingly needed, the report said.

Nationally, the 2002-03 average teacher salary, which is the most recent figure available, was \$45,771, up 3.3 percent from the previous year. The average beginning teacher salary was \$29,564, up 3.2 percent from the year before. But AFT's report noted that teachers' share of health insurance costs spiked an average 13 percent, according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics.

"Exorbitant health insurance costs are taking an intolerable bite out of already inadequate teacher salaries. Teachers are being asked to do more, shortages persist in the most challenging areas to teach, yet compensation packages are insulting," said AFT Secretary-Treasurer Edward J. McElroy.

Furthermore, the AFT noted, superintendents' average salaries are as much as four times higher than teachers' average pay. "States and school districts are crying poverty when it comes to teachers' pay yet somehow find money for extravagant administrator salaries," McElroy said.

California led the nation with the highest average teacher salary for 2002-03, at \$55,693. South Dakota had the nation's lowest average teacher salary, at \$32,414. Alaska led the nation with the highest average beginning teacher salary for 2002-03, at \$37,401. Montana had the nation's lowest average beginning teacher salary, at \$23,052.

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The AFT represents 1.3 million pre-K through 12th-grade teachers; paraprofessionals and other school-related personnel; higher education faculty and professional staff; nurses and healthcare workers; and federal, state and local government employees.
