Secretarial Prohibitions—Limits on Federal Authority

The Every Student Succeeds Act includes a number of prohibitions on the authority of the secretary of education and the U.S. Department of Education. These include:

- Prohibiting the secretary from promulgating rules on the accountability system that are
 inconsistent with or outside the scope of the statutory requirements, or from adding new
 criteria through regulations that are inconsistent with or outside the scope of the statutory
 requirements.
- Prohibiting the secretary from conditioning state plan approval, revisions to a plan, or the approval of a waiver request by adding requirements that are inconsistent with or outside the scope of the statutory requirements.
- Prohibiting the secretary from prescribing:
 - o Specific academic assessments or assessment items, including the Common Core.
 - Specific long-term goals, indicators, weights of indicators, methodology, school support and improvement strategies, and exit criteria in the accountability system.
 - Any aspect or parameter of a teacher, principal or other school leader evaluation system, or indicators or specific measure of teacher, principal or other school leader effectiveness.

Additionally, the secretary is not permitted to issue guidance that provides a strictly limited or exhaustive list to illustrate successful implementation or purports to be legally binding.

Lastly, the secretary is not permitted to define terms in the agreement through regulations that are inconsistent with or outside the scope of the statutory requirements or to collect any data except from existing federal, state and local reporting requirements.
