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NEW JERSEY RANKS THIRD IN THE NATION FOR TEACHER PAY

New Jersey ranked Third in the nation for its average teacher salary in 2006-07, according to the American Federation of Teachers' (AFT) *Survey and Analysis of Teacher Salary Trends 2007*.

The average teacher salary in New Jersey for the 2006-07 school year was \$59,730—a 2.5 percent increase from the previous year. New Jersey was ranked first in the nation for beginning teacher salaries, at \$44,523, an increase of 3.4 percent from 2005-06.

In New Jersey, the average salary for charter school teachers was \$45,858; beginning charter school teachers' salaries averaged \$41,959.

Traditional public school teacher salaries for other states in the Mid-Atlantic Region ranked as follows: New York was ranked fourth in the nation, at \$59,557; Maryland was eighth, at \$56,927; Pennsylvania was 10th, at \$54,977; and Delaware was 12th, at \$54,537.

California had the highest average teacher salary, at \$63,640, while South Dakota reported the lowest, at \$35,378.

The Survey and Analysis of Teacher Salary Trends 2007 uses data from state education agencies, the U.S. Department of Defense, the Bureau of Labor Statistics, the Department of Housing and Urban Development, the U.S. Census Bureau and the Bureau of Economic Analysis.
