## **TEXAS RANKS 29TH IN THE NATION FOR TEACHER PAY**

Texas ranked 29th in the nation for its average teacher salary in 2006-07, according to the American Federation of Teachers' (AFT) *Survey and Analysis of Teacher Salary Trends 2007*.

The average teacher salary in Texas for the 2006-07 school year was \$45,392—a 7.5 percent increase from the previous year. Texas was ranked 10th in the nation for beginning teacher salaries, at \$38,522, an increase of 10.4 percent from 2005-06.

Traditional public school teacher salaries for other states in the Southwest Region ranked as follows: Arizona was ranked 31st in the nation, at \$44,700; New Mexico was 40th, at \$42,780; and Oklahoma was 41st, at \$42,379.

California had the highest average teacher salary, at \$63,640, while South Dakota reported the lowest, at \$35,378.

The Survey and Analysis of Teacher Salary Trends 2007 uses data from state education agencies, the U.S. Department of Defense, the Bureau of Labor Statistics, the Department of Housing and Urban Development, the U.S. Census Bureau and the Bureau of Economic Analysis.
