STATE MEDICAID FACTS

Protect Your Healthcare, Schools and Hospitals

The U.S. House of Representatives has approved \$880 billion in cuts that will likely come from Medicaid.

One plan could cause 1,417,000 people in North Carolina to lose coverage from NC Medicaid (the state's Medicaid program). cccxvii North Carolina would lose \$17.3 billion under another proposal. cccxviii That money will be made up through firing public service workers, raising taxes or kicking people off of NC Medicaid.

In North Carolina, 2,433,285 people are supported by Medicaid, cccxcix This includes 37% percent of moms giving birth,cd 41% percent of children^{cdi} and 61% percent of grandparents and other seniors in nursing homes in North Carolina. cdii Medicaid also supports veterans, students, working families and AFT members.

School health professionals, like speech pathologists, occupational therapists and school nurses and psychologists, all rely on Medicaid funding. Without Medicaid, they will not be able to help as many of the 202,000 students in North Carolina schools with disabilities. cdiii

place of primary care, and staffing and workplace violence in hospitals will worsen if Medicaid funding is cut.

Medicaid accounts for 19 percent of all payments to hospitals nationwide. cuts could lead to longer wait times, rushed care, hospital closures and an increase in workplace violence and other challenges faced by our healthcare members. Rural areas and small towns could be impacted the worst, with families having to travel hours for maternity or cancer care. cdv



North Carolina receives \$14,779,000,000 in federal Medicaid funding annually. cdvi Gutting Medicaid will mean job losses—in hospitals, in schools and to North Carolina public service jobs.

We're in this fight together.
